Forensic Anthropologist to Speak at May Meeting

Dr. Alexis Gray is a forensic anthropologist with the San Bernardino County Coroner's Division consulting on 20-30 skeletal cases per year. She also teaches full time at Riverside Community College and part-time for Cal Poly Pomona. In 2005 Dr. Gray was honored as the *RCC, Norco campus Outstanding Part-Time Teacher of the Year*. In addition to teaching Physical, Cultural and Forensic Anthropology, she has taught courses in Environment and Technology, Medical Anthropology, Magic Witchcraft and Religion of North American Indians.

After reading a newspaper article about Dr. Gray and her work with the San Bernardino Coroner's office, the Redlands Math-Science committee asked her to be a presenter at the 2005 Conference. Dr. Gray has generously shared her time and expertise with the girls at the last three conferences. The January 9, 2005 *Press Enterprise* article, "Girls Hear About Value of Math and Science," said:

"In the session "Skeletons & Science: Careers in Forensics and Anthropology," Alexis Gray described her job with the San Bernardino County coroner's office. Students seemed fascinated by Gray's props - the skeletal remains of a man who died in 1863. "They can figure out how old, what sex and height all from the bones," said 13-year-old Casey Mendoza. "I think that's amazing." Students asked Gray many questions following her presentation, which included inquiries about her pay and the education required. Casey, however, asked if the job was similar to those on television shows like "Law & Order" or "CSI." "Basically, those shows take the jobs of 15 people and give it to one or two guys," Gray responded."

Alexis received her bachelor's degree from CSU Los Angeles, her master's degree from CSU Fullerton, and, in June 2006, her Ph.D. in Anthropology from UC Riverside.

Come to the May meeting to learn more about the fascinating and diverse field of Forensic Anthropology.
