## **If These Buckets Could Talk: Tales from the Museum Collections**

Michelle Nielsen, curator of history at the San Bernardino County Museum, will be our speaker at our June meeting. Michelle will be telling us some of the unique and important tales behind some of the objects at the Museum; stories that illuminate lifestyles of the past, in and around San Bernardino and our southwest.

Can you think of a special family treasure you have at home? Chances are when you think about it, you think of the stories behind it and about the family members it represents. It is a connection between you and your ancestors. Many of the objects in the museum collections have a unique story to tell as well as the power to reveal something about history for those who study and enjoy them.

Michele's area of interest is post-Gold Rush California history, specifically the material culture of southern California. She is currently conducting research into the history of San Bernardino County and has a publication forthcoming. In her work at the museum, she enjoys giving workshops and programs to the public utilizing the wealth of artifacts contained in the museum collections. Specifically Michele is interested in the historic insights that primary source materials such as objects and photographs have to offer about the daily lives of those who have lived long ago.

Michele's educational background includes a degree from the University of Redlands and she is currently working on her master's degree at Claremont Graduate University. She lives with her family in Redlands.

## **Tech Trek Girls Off to Camp**

The San Geronio Interest Group is presently completing plans to send six girls to Tech Trek at the University of California, San Diego, July 15th to the 21st. Thanks to the generosity of the Sun Lakes Charity Golf Tournament, other community organizations and individuals, we are able to send three girls this year, one from each of the middle schools in the Pass Area. The cost to us is \$750 per camper. According to Tech Trek rules, if a girl is chosen as an alternate she may pay her own way to camp, and three of our alternates have chosen to do so. Tech Trek has been very enthusiastically received by school personnel, parents and students. This is the fourth year that we have provided the Tech Trek experience to girls from the Pass Area. To date eleven girls have attended Tech Trek.

This year the committee reviewed 22 applications and essays, interviewed 11 girls, and selected three recipients and five alternates. The members who served on the selection committee were Mary Belle Clark, Charlene Fink, Ann Harding, Carol Howard, Debbie Lewin, and Ellie Reben.

Leaders in DC want to know what position AAUW takes on issues important to us. How about that!

## New California Public Policy Priorities Adopted

At the State Convention, the 2007-2009 Public Policy Priorities for California, as proposed in the March 2007 *California Perspectives*, were adopted. A few changes were made before they were approved, and appear below. Changes are shown by words being underlined if added, and crossed out if removed.

### Biennial Public Policy Action Priorities for 2007-2009

Legislative activism has long history in AAUW. Members first lobbied for women's suffrage in 1892 and have continued to be responsive to critical issues of the times.

The AAUW Public Policy program supports its mission to advance equity for women and girls, through advocacy, education and research and complements the Association Public Policy program. AAUW California's priorities for action are chosen according to the criteria of viability, critical need, and strong member support.

### Equity

Recognizing that equity for all women and girls requires an application of legal definition, AAUW California supports:

- Constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals
- Legislation that addresses current inequities in compensation and benefits for all working women
- Vigorous enforcement of California Title V and Federal Title IX regulations statutes on gender equality

### Education

Believing that public education and lifelong learning are the foundations of a democratic society, AAUW California supports:

- Equitable funding for quality public education in preschool through secondary schools that support all students of any culture, race, ethnicity, special needs or sexual orientation
- Opposition to the use of public funds for school vouchers
- Continuing educational research and reform that improves student achievement
- Programs that provide women with education, training, and support for long-term success in the work force and the community
- Medically accurate health curriculum, including comprehensive sex education

### Societal Change

Promoting the societal, economic, and physical well-being of all individuals, AAUW California supports:

- Right to determine one's reproductive life, including the right to privacy and access to quality family planning services
- Access to health care and the expansion of patient rights
- Greater availability and access to high quality, affordable family care giving services including rigorous oversight
- Respect for diversity and the rejection of all forms of discrimination
- Access to decent, affordable housing
- Promotion of safe, healthy work environments free from sexual harassment and intimidation
- Freedom from violence and fear in homes, schools, workplaces, and communities
