## AAUW CA President to Visit Branch November 7

Donna Lilly, the first co-president of the California AAUW, will speak to Redlands Branch members Tuesday evening, Nov. 7.

The dinner meeting will begin at 6 p.m. in the Casa Loma Room at the University of Redlands. The program, which begins at 7 p.m., is free to members who choose not to come for the meal.

"A lot of positive changes have occurred in AAUW" since she first became involved at the state level 12 years ago, said Ms. Lilly.

In addition to giving her vision of the future of AAUW in California, Ms. Lilly will also address what the member in the local branch receives from the organization. A portion of each member's dues go to support AAUW at both the state and national levels. The services and support received, both immediate and long-range, will be addressed by the state president.

Ms. Lilly is serving this year as co-president of California, the largest state in membership in the Association, with Rita Wustner of Walnut Creek, in northern California. Ms. Lilly's home is in Encinitas, near San Diego. Because they are in constant communication with each other and because of last year spent as co-presidents-elect, they are able to function effectively, Ms. Lilly has said.

Ms. Lilly brings to her role as co-president a variety of experience at the state level. She first served on the CA AAUW Board of Directors as Southern District director. Her ensuing state-wide responsibilities included chair of the Nominating Committee, communications director and membership vice president. She hopes Redlands Branch members will come prepared with questions for her about the status of AAUW in California. "If I don't know the answer now, I'll research the matter and get back to you," she promised.

## AAUW Public Policy Committee Contest

Our foremothers, the suffragettes of the nineteenth century, certainly knew the importance of public policy action and how to apply it. Their work took 72 years and was deemed a success only when an amendment to the U.S. Constitution granted women the right to vote. Well, we have had the right to vote for 85 years. But more importantly do we accept our full responsibility as citizens and exercise our right to vote?

Since The Public Policy Committee in AAUW has the responsibility of encouraging our members to vote we urge you to read material printed by The Public Policy Institute of California ([www.ppic.org](http://www.ppic.org)). They recently presented the following troubling research: *“Today, eight in ten adults are eligible to vote but just 56% are registered ... and only 35% of these adults can be expected to vote in the November election. Voter registration has grown at a slower rate than the population. As a result, 12 million of the state’s 27.7 million adults are not registered to vote. Moreover, although the state has become increasingly diverse, the adults ... (voting) are predominantly white, aged 45 and older, and relatively affluent.*

What does the research in the forgoing paragraph mean? What does it mean to women? What does it mean to members of the Redlands Branch of AAUW? This committee asks each Redlands Branch member to do her own analysis of the data. Then submit your analysis at the November meeting to answer the question: what does this information mean to women voters in California, and more importantly, to the members of the Redlands Branch.

The following rules apply: Format must be two-dimensional and may include charts, graphs, prose, poetry, etc. and must contain 100 words or less. Size is limited to 28” by 22.” Originality, interest and aptness of thought will weigh in the judges’ decision. A 3x5 inch index card containing the name, address, phone number must be affixed firmly to the back of each submission. Each member may submit only one item for judging.

A member of the Public Policy Committee will be near the registration table to collect submissions. All material to be judged must be brought to the meeting prior to the opening of the meeting by the president.
